On this day, devotees offer milk, flowers, and prayers to snakes, idols, or images of Nag Devta, seeking protection, prosperity, and blessings. The festival symbolizes faith, fertility, and harmony with nature, honoring snakes as guardians of life and water sources.

Nag Panchami is a sacred Hindu festival observed on the fifth day (Panchami) of the Shravan month, usually falling in July or August. The festival is dedicated to the worship of serpent deities, known as Nagas, who are regarded as protectors of life, fertility, and water sources. Devotees offer milk, flowers, turmeric, and prayers at temples, anthills, or snake idols to seek protection from snakebites, misfortune, and to bring prosperity to their families. Beyond its religious aspect, Nag Panchami also symbolizes harmony between humans and nature, highlighting the cultural respect for snakes as vital to ecological balance.

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
